FROM THE PASTOR

I Love My Church

Do YOU love your church? I do! I love THE church and MY church, St. Luke's Methodist Church. In this part of the country, it is not too unusual for folks to profess their love and care for their church and the people who love them within their congregation. We are fortunate to live where it's not considered inappropriate conversation to talk about what God means to us and how our worshiping community matters!

My favorite story is from when my daughter was about three, and we walked down the steps from First UMC in Houston, where I was appointed. It had been a long morning, and my sights were set on just getting home. Caroline's little voice interrupted my thoughts when she asked, **"Why does everyone love me**?" Her dad and I were taken aback, and then our hearts melted. She was so deeply and constantly "loved on" by members and nursery caregivers that in her young experience, it was as if EVERYONE knew her and loved her. Friends, I don't know many places where a child or adult can be loved simply because they "are!" We cannot afford to underestimate how the love of Christ changes lives through his bride, the church.

So please, I urge you to love your church! How?..... We love our church if we love one another at St. Luke's. If we love the ministries that extend love to others beyond the church, we love our church. We love our church if we love the sick and homebound, the young and vulnerable in our congregation. If we like to talk about what St. Luke's means to us and how it helps us, then we love our church. We love our church if we invite and bring friends and strangers to church. If we can forgive the imperfections of the people in the church, then we love our church. We love our church if we are serious about our vows to uphold our church with our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. If we say we love Jesus, then we are called to love the church because the church is Christ's presence in the world.

In February, we will focus on what it means to love and support our church so that the Kingdom of God will be more vibrantly present among us and in us. Remember, loving your church means regularly bringing your love to our worshiping community and expressing it to all.

-Psalm 133:1 says, **"Behold, how good and pleasant it is for brothers to dwell together in unity!"** When selfless love is present, unity is sure to follow!

I'm so grateful for each of you in this season of recalibrating and expanding ministry in all churches climbing out of the "COVID" era of lethargy. Your participation and support are the only ingredients necessary to prove that God's not done with His church or people.




YOU'RE INVITIED TO





WHAT IS LENT?

The Reasons for the Season



Next to Advent and Christmas, Lent is one of the church's most celebrated and revered seasons. Almost everybody knows the basics about Lent: it begins on Ash Wednesday, lasts several weeks in which people routinely "give up" something, and concludes on Easter Sunday with a celebration of the Risen Christ.

But how many people, both practicing Catholics and otherwise, know about the meanings and history behind many of our Lenten traditions? We talked to Father Czeslaw Krysa, diocesan director of the Office of Worship and rector of St. Casimir Church in Buffalo, to gain further insight into the traditions of Lent.



Christians are called to attend worship and receive ashes marked on their forehead in the sign of a cross. The ashes are made from the remains of the burned palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday services. It is also recommended Christians fast on Ash Wednesday, abstaining from meat. Note the significance of the ashes, as it is symbolic of freeing ourselves from the unnecessary as "remember you are dust and to dust you will return."

Traditionally, Ash Wednesday prepared Catholics for baptism and the reconciliation of penitence.

The imposition of ashes was a sign of entrance into the state of pentance. People who committed major, not just mortal, sin were enrolled into penitence meant they had ashes imposed and stood at the back of the church and did not receive the Eucharist until they were reconciled on Holy Thursday.

What is Lent?

Beginning on Ash Wednesday and concluding on Easter Sunday, Lent is marked by 40 days on the Church calendar where the faithful are called to purify and renew themselves spiritually.

"Lent is a time to prepare for the renewal of our life in the Resurrection, and a renewal of our baptismal experience of Jesus and our Risen Lord,"

Why do we "give up" something during Lent?

Many Christians make personal sacrifice pledges to themselves during Lent, such as giving up chocolate, alcohol or coffee. But with that sacrifice should be a pledge to give something of yourselves, to walk in the path of Christ. For us to be renewed, (we) have to take some kind of spiritual journey, or I call, a spiritual workout. If you want to work out and get healthy, you go and you train. This is a spiritual training time, and therefore, makes a person healthier. That's part of it, but another part of it is dieting and fasting. There's a difference between abstaining and fasting, such as abstaining from certain types of food like meat on Fridays, while fasting is limiting the amount of food you take. Downsizing is another good word. That's

Why do we abstain from meat on Fridays and fast days?

In ancient tradition, different religions picked different days of the week to fast, so while Hebrews had Tuesdays and Thursdays, Christians fasted on Wednesdays and Fridays. That is where the customary observance for Fridays came from, and also connects to Good Friday.

As far as abstaining from meat goes, unlike modern society, meat was considered a luxury in the past, and only consumed on special occasions like a Feast day.

"It wasn't as available and more expensive, Pork, in European society, was a sign of prosperity because of the fat. So meat was connected to something that was not daily. Everything else was daily fare. In the time of Christ, what we would consider a hamburger and fries was a regular dinner, it would be salt and bread." one aspect, which leads to renewal. Christians should also share the fruits of their fasting.

"When I deny myself, I need to place at the table somebody who is less fortunate and needy. That's the origin of Christian fasting. I hear people say, 'I'm not going to Starbucks during Lent. The money I save by not going to Starbucks, I can put aside and give it to the food pantry. We gather the fruits of the fast.

"It's not just writing a check, it's connected with our fasting and purifying ourselves. Fasting and abstinence needs to have the other side of the coin. What I deny myself, I have to give to somebody else."

Why is Easter on a different day each year?

The Lenten calendar changes each year, because

tradition dictates that Easter should fall on the Sunday following the first full moon after the spring equinox. Because of this tradition, Easter will always fall between March 22 and April 25.

Once the date of Easter is decided, the Lenten calendar goes back 40 days (excluding Sundays) to determine Ash Wednesday. The 40 days tradition stems from the amount of time Jesus Christ spent wandering and

fasting in the Judaean Desert. Excluding Sundays from Lenten fasting connects to Sundays celebrating the Resurrection of Christ, and, in modern parlance, gives Catholics a "cheat day" from their Lenten sacrifice.



Meals on Wheels

Did you know that St. Luke's volunteers for our local Meals on Wheels program? Two months a year, two of our members deliver food to local people in our community that are suffering from food insecurities. Many older adults struggling with health, mobility, or finances can receive small healthy meals five days a week because of Meals on Wheels.


