FROM THE PASTOR

You Get What You Give

People matter! In God's view, everyone has the same intrinsic value because we are all His creation. This is a demanding truth when we consider that much of the world doesn't believe in the very God who has literally made their life and provided for their culture, their resources, and their communities. From a biblical viewpoint, however, we see that God has shown love and given opportunities for redemption to the very ones who would snub their nose at God. Think of the evil Ninevites in the book of Jonah. God desired that they would repent and believe in Him, so reluctant Jonah was drafted into that divine mission. Consider the prophetic book of Hosea. In this curious story, we read about a man of God, Hosea, who God instructs to buy back his wife, Gomer, from another man (Hosea 3:1). In this scenario, Gomer is a metaphor for those not faithful to God's covenant. And Hosea's tolerance and efforts to redeem an unfaithful wife symbolize God's long and unrelenting reach toward his rebellious people. Finally, we think about Christ, the victim of an inconceivable display of human rebellion and sin against God. Even in the ultimate rejection of God, we see our Creator moving beyond our rejection to love us back into His fold.

The repetition of God's unfathomable love for humans in the midst of disobedience and rejection of the Divine should jolt us into the truth of God: He loves every person equally and expects us to do the same. In the face of this, we are confronted with the big question; how do we even BEGIN to follow this example of loving tolerance?

The Apostle Paul is a good place to begin. Studying Paul is in itself studying the actions and revelations of a first-generation Christian struggling to bring a diverse and often hostile world to Christ. And in his untiring effort to do so, Paul reveals one habit we can all work on emulating today. He addresses every person receiving his letters in love, valuing and appreciating personal supporters and ardent enemies alike:

- "I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you" (Romans 1:8).
- "I always thank my God for you" (1 Corinthians 1:4).
- "Ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, I have not stopped giving thanks for you" (Ephesians 1:15 16).
- "I thank my God every time I remember you" (Philippians 1:3).
- "I thank God . . . as night and day I constantly remember you in my prayers, . . . I long to see you" (2 Timothy 1:3 4).

Paul wrote to every community as if all members were equally important and valuable. He wanted them to live into that reality and to experience a call toward God even if they were demonstrating disrespect and rebellion. Wouldn't it be a "new day" in our modern world if our social media, behind-the-scenes conversations, and interactions conveyed the same profound appreciation for others demonstrated by the Apostle above?

What holds us back? Do we revel in our sense of being right and accurate over the feelings of folks around us? Is it easier to be irritated and mad than overcome hatred with love? Are power and intimidation our chief aim over and against humility and concern for others? Whatever our reasons for "writing off" individuals or whole groups of people, we do ourselves no favors. In the end, the judgment we demonstrate becomes the same narrative applied to our lives as well. But the love we show will be the love that comes back to us. And that is GREAT NEWS!

"Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

Painting, yard work, cleaning, organizing: every job you can imagine. Be on the look out for more information and a list of specific projects.



On Pentecost Sunday, we remember the day the disciples received the Holy Spirit in a special way. The story in Acts 2 describes a powerful wind and tongues of fire as the Holy Spirit was poured out on people from all over the world who came to Jerusalem to celebrate a Jewish feast. At the first Pentecost over 3000 people were baptized, creating the first church. This is why Pentecost is known as the birthday of the Christian church. The word Pentecost comes from a Greek word meaning fiftieth. The Jewish Festival of Pentecost (called Shavuot, meaning "weeks" in Hebrew) falls on the fiftieth day after the original Passover. On that day, God gave the Torah to Moses on Mount Sinai. The Christian festival of Pentecost falls on the 50th day after the resurrection of Jesus.

Pentecost for Christians culminates the celebration and work of the church begun on Easter Day. In much of early Christianity, Easter Day (not Pentecost) became the primary day for baptisms. After their baptism, the newly baptized were then trained in basic Christian doctrine, including the meaning of the sacraments they had now experienced, as they prepared to take up their ministries in the life of the church. On Pentecost, Christians primarily celebrate the commissioning of new members into ministry. Some do this through services of confirmation on Pentecost. And still others have also, historically, offered baptism on Pentecost as well.

Have questions? We have answers!

Two colors are historically associated with Pentecost. Red is a visual reminder of the "tongues of fire" that empowered the apostles and others to proclaim the good news of Christ's resurrection in many languages to the crowds of pilgrims from many lands (Acts 2:3). White was used in some places, including England, where Pentecost had also become a day for baptisms by the Middle Ages. Whether it happened at Easter or Pentecost or at some other time, those being baptized were given new white robes to wear as a sign they had taken off the world, died to sin, and were raised with the risen Christ to new life. This is why Pentecost may also be referred to in English as "Whitsunday" or "White Sunday." The Season after Pentecost is the time of the church year to support new disciples and the whole congregation in living out the gifts we have been given in the name of Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit.

We will be celebrating Pentecost on May 28.
We hope to see you at worship as we experience the coming of the Holy Spirit.


