My mother loved being the leader of the Camp Fire Girls' troop of which I was a member. She meticulously planned every week for our meetings.

We girls gloried in the fun of riding in the camper of my dad's old ford pick-up to Tyler State Park.

We were proud to choose our Indian names, which signified our particular characteristics.

We loved wearing our vests to school on the day we met.

We eagerly gathered in each other's homes after school to learn something new about being really great at life.

All of this functioned for a higher purpose. The program of Camp Fire Girls was meant to help us socialize, develop important skills, and become more practical and discerning. My mother KNEW, however, how helpful all of this could be. And so ...she PREPARED for our gatherings, like a good teacher does for every class. (And she was a former teacher and graduate of Rice University).

Patty Andrews wasn't perfect, but she was wise, painstakingly conscientious, and PREPARED. It follows quite logically, therefore, that she loved the motto, "Always Be Prepared." She recited it to our group like it was the national motto for the organization. It wasn't until I was well into adulthood that I realized Patty had "pulled a fast one!" She "appropriated" the Boy Scout motto, thinking what was good for the boys was just as well for the girls too! She could be savvy about life. Perhaps that is the biggest lesson here, learning to adapt and adjust.

As we enter 2024, I find that the lessons of my youth are still the things that are indispensable for moving forward, not only personally, but corporately as well. Mottos can seem simplistic and impossible to live up to all of the time, but still, they are a reminder, a goal, a plumb line, a course corrector.

As we navigate a new year, we will be challenged with looking for ways to work ahead of the needs of our church and the people around us. We will PREPARE, and yet know that part of that preparation is the ability and willingness to change course (adapt and adjust) when necessary - and cheerfully look for new and innovative ways to be an effective faith community, one in which the truth and love of Christ is abundant for all.

I don't know what your life "motto" is or will be. The seasons of your life might determine your priorities. Some of us will search for ways to be more productive and healthy, while others of us may be looking for peace and assurance. Whatever suits our situations in life and at St. Luke's Methodist Church, we know that PREPARATION IS AN INVITATION for God to be our guide and strength.

"Seek His will in all you do, and he will show you which path to take. Trust in the Lord with all your heart, do not depend on your own understanding." (Psalm 32:8)

Are you fixed upon the command to be prepared for the coming of the Lord?

Are you ready to cast your tent where He leads you?

Are you willing to let your identity be found in his name?

ARE YOU LIVING LIKE A BUCKET OR A PIPE?

Are you living like a bucket or a pipe? This is a rather odd metaphorical question; yet, consider the purpose of each. A bucket is designed to hold things (liquids, dirt, etc.). A pipe is designed to convey things through it (water, gas, etc.). The bucket holds what it receives, while the pipe passes on what it receives. Let me ask: In regard to the material possessions that God has entrusted to you, are you living like a bucket or a pipe? Are you holding on or passing on?

Living like a bucket occurs when we ignore the inherit limit of only gathering things to ourselves. The phrase, "the one who dies with the most toys wins" is humorous, but sadly, all too descriptive for many of us. We are warned against this in Psalm 49:

"Do not be overawed when others grow rich [when he has a big bucket and it is full], when the splendor of their houses increases; for they will take nothing with him when they die, their splendor will not descend with them."

We will ironically and sadly find ourselves with nothing in the end if our ultimate goal is simply to gain everything for ourselves only.

As we orient ourselves toward being good caregivers of our church and its ministry, let us remember that in God's economy, a pipe is infinitely more useful to Him than a bucket! He created us to be conduits and not receptacles of His blessings. What happens if a pipe gets confused and starts thinking it is a bucket? Things gets stuck, the pipe gets clogged, and the only solution is for the pipe to be "roto-rooted" so it can go back to doing what it was made to do—let things flow through it, not just to it.

We will soon complete a season in which so many things flowed toward us and our families, and yet ironically, we will feel empty and impoverished because of the money and resources we spent on ourselves. Regardless of this, January and February will be a time in which we will look at how to be open and generous conduits for supporting St. Luke's financially and in all other ways. We will have to figure out how to unclog our pipes!

"Instruct those who are rich in this present world [high capacity pipes] not to be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly supplies us with all things to enjoy. Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share [let it flow freely], storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is life indeed." (1 Timothy 6: 17-19)

PURPOSES OF YOUTH MINISTRY

The heart of youth ministry is to help students grow in their relationship with Christ. We do activities and events to help students grow closer to Christ. It can be easy to lose sight of our goal by focusing on entertaining and getting students to come to youth group. We must walk a fine line between what we do to attract students and what is our ultimate goal of having them in youth group.

PURPOSE #1

BUILD MEANINGFUL RELATIONSHIPS

Youth groups exist to establish meaningful relationships between mature adult believers and students for the purpose of helping the student grow in their relationship with the Lord. Students want to learn from people who care about them; they want to be discovered and known. When youth ministries create opportunities for students to step into meaningful relationships with adult believers, they lay a foundation for both evangelism and discipleship.

PURPOSE #2

DISCIPLESHIP

Most youth workers would agree that youth ministries exist for the purpose of discipleship. Discipleship as multiplication through relationships. Through relationships we make disciples who, in turn, build relationships and make more disciples. Youth ministries that focus on and prioritize discipleship help students walk in obedience to the commands of Christ through a Christ-centered relationship with a mature believer. Rather than settling for shallow faith, they prepare students to make a commitment to faith in Christ, feed themselves spiritually, and consistently live out their faith at church and in the world. In a healthy youth ministry, transformation is valued over attendance numbers. And there are always more adult volunteers who are focused on building Christ-centered relationships with students for the purpose of discipleship, than adult volunteers who are helping with logistics.

PURPOSE #3

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Youth Ministries can't just have programs for students. They need programs that allow students to have a ministry to their world. When students see themselves as participants, they will pick and choose what they like at church. But when students see themselves as leaders, they will invest in the ministry of the church and become lifelong owners of the church. As Christians, we have a responsibility to God to develop ourselves as leaders in order to be of the most use in the Kingdom. We also have a responsibility to hand off the reigns of leadership to those on the path behind us. In light of this, student leadership development is not only a good idea, it is essential for building God's Kingdom.
