# **OF FIRST IMPORTANCE**

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# **"THE CLIFF NOTES TO SALVATION"**

We all remember cliff notes. They were used by students ubiquitously and surreptitiously, especially in college settings, in order to gain a summary understanding of a book we didn't have time to read for the test! (Unfortunately for the student, most professors have read the cliff notes and therefore take special care to demand knowledge of the book *not included in the cliff notes!*) Even though we think of these little academic tools as "cheating," the message of Christ was meant to be short, to the point, and without nuance. The "cliff notes" of the faith are often far more important than long musings with excessive nuance.

As a matter of fact, we find the gospel message in cliff notes fashion in 1 Corinthians 15, where the Apostle Paul declares the core of the Gospel—that Jesus is the Christ, that he died on the cross for our sins, and that he was raised on the third day. This passage, from one of Paul's earlier letters, has the marks of being an early creed of the church, meaning it functioned as a mnemonic device to help people recall the Gospel. And it's worth highlighting the repeated phrase "*in accordance with the Scriptures." It calls upon the whole of scripture (the Hebrew Scriptures and the new emerging letters and gospels), confirming that Jesus is Christ indeed.* 


Unfortunately, a modern Christian's mark is an unclear expression of faith that is not easily summarized. Many of us have tended to excessively emphasize a willingness to accept diverse beliefs, musings and over-emphasized nuance. Furthermore, we Methodists often misuse John Wesley's quote, "We believe Christ to be the eternal, supreme God...but as to all opinions which do not strike at the root of Christianity, we think and let think," quoting the last phrase only as an underpinning for a laissez-faire attitude leading us to dismiss the importance seeking a solid base of faith. We like the "think and let think" part of Wesley's statement while excluding his emphasis on the primacy of truth found in Christ. In fact, our historic leader felt very strongly about right thinking and debated issues with his 18th-century colleagues voraciously.

While at Lincoln College at Oxford, John Wesley wrote a piece calling Christians to an authentic and accurate faith entitled "The Character of a Methodist." He said many convincing things urging Methodists to be adherents to the inspired word of God. He describes the character and nature of a true Christian: "He has inwardly and outwardly conformed to the will of God, as revealed in the written word. He thinks, speaks, and lives according to the method laid down in the **revelation of Jesus Christ**. His soul is renewed after the image of God, in righteousness and all true holiness. Having the mind that was in Christ, he walks as Christ also walked. By these marks and fruits of living faith, do we labor to distinguish ourselves from the unbelieving world, from all those whose minds or lives are not according to the Gospel of Christ?"

In the weeks of Eastertide and leading to Pentecost on May 19th, let us pursue the same goal outlined by Wesley, that we may "distinguish ourselves from the unbelieving world." Our preaching series on Sundays will focus on understanding the confirmed, historic, and scriptural basics of the Christian faith. We will reclaim John Wesley's call to live by and believe in the revelation of Christ.

Because the Apostle Paul writes about "Of First Importance" in 1 Corinthians 15: 3-4, and because our particular history calls us to a correct knowledge of the Gospel, you will be presented with our sermon series, "OF FIRST IMPORTANCE." May we know our faith clearly, speak about our faith accurately, and live out our faith sincerely?

"For I delivered unto you **of first importance** all that I received, how Christ died for our sins **by the scriptures**; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." 1 Cor 15: 3-4



#### Did you know that we have Upper Room Daily Devotional guides available in the church office?

New guides are released every other month to help guide you through your daily walk with Christ.

The Upper Room is a daily devotional magazine published in more than 30 languages and 100 countries around the world. The daily meditations are written by readers of the magazine and others interested in sharing their faith experiences through writing—both laity and clergy, published authors and new writers. The meditations are stories of real people working to live faithfully with the Bible as their touchstone. Every day, readers of *The Upper Room* around the world read the same story in many different languages and pray the same prayer together. Some of our readers share comments on our website (upperroom.org/devotionals), and some writers share extra pieces of their writing on our blog (upperroom.org/devotionals/blog-posts). The daily devotional guide and the community it draws together invite people to:

- listen to scripture as God's personal message, linking their stories to God's story;
- commune with God in prayer;
- see their daily choices and small acts of obedience as part of God's work;
- realize our connection through Christ as a universal family of believers; encounter the living Christ and be transformed into Christ's likeness.

The St. Luke's Trustees Team has been busy keeping up with all things that make our campus run.

Here are a couple of current project updates:

#### **Hand Rails**

A)-Sanctuary steps completed. Welding & fabrication cost
\$652 by Jessie Skinner. Dan prepped it grinding off the edges and sharp spots and then we painted it.
B)-Parsonage hand rails -WIP.
C)-Laird Hall hand rails-WIP.

#### Roofing

Repairs to different buildings 1 on each, this has already been approved. Cost \$3495. WIP-We're still waiting on Curtis-McKinley to get started.

#### **Sprinkler System**

We've got a bad back flow valve and some leaking PVC connections. This back flow valve keeps possibly contaminated water from flowing back into our drinking water system (potable water) and are required by law. Almost all things on a potable water system just cost more because of a higher standard of safety. That includes the contractors we have to use. They have to be a licensed irrigation approved contractor. A lot of normal plumbers are not licensed for this work. We currently have 2 bids for this project and we will be moving forward soon.

#### **Office Sidewalk**

We have begun removing the outdoor carpeting on the sidewalk outside the office. It will be scraped & scrubbed to remove the old glue and made smooth. We're exploring different options to make the pathway more appealing, easier to maintain and of course safer.





## THE DISTRACTED AMERICAN FAMILY: PART ONE

It's Saturday night in small-town America, and "the Smith" family has decided to go out for dinner. The kids pick Chili's, and even though mom and dad don't care for the food there, they have relented because it's reasonably priced for a family of four (and mom has a coupon). After the family gets settled into a four-top booth in the bustling restaurant, Johnny (who is seven) pulls out his tablet and begins to play Roblox, his favorite game, and Sally (who is twelve) begins to scroll through Tik-Tok on her new iPhone. After deciding what to eat (the kids already know they want chicken strips), dad removes his iPhone from his pocket and begins to tidy up his work email, responding to some clients, and mom removes her iPhone from her purse and finishes the order for that lamp she's been wanting for the bedroom from her amazon app.

If you took a picture of the Smith's as they sit in their booth at Chili's waiting for their food, you would see each person pleasantly focused on his/her own individual digital pursuit. No one is arguing. No one is doing anything "wrong" per se. Each person is sitting within inches of the other's physical proximity, but they might as well be miles apart because no one is engaging with each other. Unfortunately, this picture is not confined to the Smith's Saturday night outings; this kind of distracted lifestyle is typical of the majority of their activities. It is not only typical of the Smith's, it is also common in households across America, where families sit in isolation from one another even though they are physically "together."

So, how do we repair the cultural problem of distraction in the American family? I'd like to take the next few newsletter articles to spell out some very practical ideas for just how to do that from a Biblical perspective, but let me first say that a great place to start is dinner time. What if (and parents, you have to set the example!) mom and dad required that the family eat dinner together each night (insofar as it is reasonably possible, barring any emergencies, of course) and no one was allowed to engage a digital device (including the television) during dinner time? Dad or mom could begin the meal by praying briefly, and each person could tell the family about his/her "high's" and "low's" for the day. Mom and/or Dad could then choose a single verse or passage from the Bible to read out loud to the family and briefly discuss it together. (I am currently working on a family devotional designed around our Global Methodist Church Catechism that will be available for all our church families.) Here is the order again: 1. Mom or Dad pray over the meal. 2. Each family member discusses his/her high's/lows. 3. One person reads a verse from the Bible and everyone discusses what it means and how to apply it to his/her own life. Ground rules: no phone, tablet, television, or computer engagement of any kind during dinner time. All phones go on "silent" or "do not disturb" during dinner time. No one is allowed to bring a digital device to the dinner table, and all televisions are turned off during dinner time. Try this for one month and report back to me with how things went. Expect that it may take a few times for everyone to adapt to this new "normal" and that it may feel awkward at first. Stick with it! Creating a new habit takes discipline and intention. When the kids see that you are being consistent, they will follow your lead. As our church focuses on getting back to things "Of First Importance," let's start with family dinner time...together!
