IT'S ALL RELATIVE, UNFORTUNATELY...

They say that fish and relatives begin to stink after 3 days. For Christians, we have a different foul factor which is putrid on a grand level. That thing is the idea of **relative truth**. Opposite of absolute truth, relative truth says that something is relatively true for one person but not another. Relative truth is conditional, subjective, varying, and contradictory. (definition by Natasha Crain)

We have finished our sermon series, "Of First Importance." We memorized Paul's statement from 1 Corinthians 15 in which Paul announces, *"I'm passing on to you, **off first importance**, what I in turn have received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures."* In his little statement, Paul demonstrates his ultimate concern that the new Christ followers understand with crystal clarity the identity of Christ and the impact of the absolute truth of Him for all people. Likewise, our focus on the basic and orthodox beliefs these past weeks was really an exercise in remembering the most important truths of being a Christian, truths which reach back in time over 2000 years and have been upheld against heretics, politics, and cultural pressure. In a word, we have engaged in Catechesis, the teachings of the one, holy, apostolic and universal church. In doing so, we are following in the brave footsteps of the heroes of the faith and also reinforcing the solid boundaries around our belief system.

Why do we need solid boundaries? Why is it necessary to say some ideas are correct and some are incorrect? It is crucial to be protected from false assertions which would lead us to live a life of mere impulses, desires, and convenient agendas. For these are the ingredients for ultimate confusion and misery. As unpopular as it is today to say, "this is right and that is wrong," it must be the case at times when we take seriously our faith, enough so that we can stand against the winds of angry mobs and cultural relativism.

Heed Paul's caution issued in his letter to the Romans in which he bemoaned those who had chosen to *"exchange truth for a lie and worshiped and served created things rather than the Creator himself."* It's exceedingly easy to exchange truth for a lie these days and not even realize it. In our laudable effort to be agreeable and sympathetic to those who differ from us, we can unintentionally take on certain world views that sound like this:

- You do you.
- Whatever makes you happy...
- Live your truth and let others live theirs.
- Different strokes for different folks...
- Above all, be accepting.

Aren't we weary, though, of the constant drumbeat of an insidious false logic: "Loving others requires an absolute acceptance and promoting of what they say and do." The challenge is this: are we interested in being 'mice or men,' as it were? Put another way, do we live to be accepted by the masses or can we hold to our faith and tolerate the inevitable social dismissal of being labeled irrelevant and uneducated? This is not a rhetorical question. Because "the struggle is real," consider these auspicious reflections on the perils of relative truth.

**"Relativism has a way of reducing our moral convictions to the level of our ice cream preferences"*

**Shirin Ebadi, lawyer and Nobel Peace Prize winner, defined cultural relativism as "nothing but an excuse to violate human rights."*

**French philosopher Jean Paul Sartre stated that "everything is permissible if God does not exist."*

**William Wilberforce, the English Statesman and friend of John Wesley, loathed moral relativism. And it was his stand against normative relativism (the idea that if it's an accepted practice it is therefore acceptable) which was the driving force in ending slavery in England.*

**Recently, the writer of a book called Mama Bear Apologetics said this: "we need an entire generation of heretics, iconoclasts, renegades, mavericks and rebels who refuse to march like good little cows, mooing in unison with the herd. When the advertisers, TikTok influencers, singing princesses, pop star divas, animated potatoes, and university professors tell them to be true to themselves, find the answers within, and follow their hearts, they say, "To hell with your dogma!"*

I'll finish on a lighter note, pun intended!

My parents used to sing to the very young versions of my sister and me a sweet little lullaby written in 1953 called "I See the Moon." The main verse is *"I see the moon and the moon sees me. God bless the moon and God bless me."* This occurs to me when I think about the song lyrics: *The moon reflects the sun. The moon is clearly not the sun. Its lower position allows the Sun's power and glory to be shown through its reflection.* In our fallen condition, let's admit we are like the moon. We are not our own light source, we can only reflect the One is the light, Christ. **We can confidently reflect the glory of the Son even on the darkest days and in the direst conditions.** The way forward in these turbulent waters is not complicated, therefore. The mission is clear. We are to be known for our love for one another. And further, that we are to follow the one who is quite literally, THE WAY, THE TRUTH, AND THE LIFE.

TRUSTEES *Report*

Sprinkler System

Expert Lawn Care, Otoniel Macedo, installed the Back-Flow Preventer Valve and new PVC piping for the sprinkler system. I still have a few minor things to do to dress up the area a little. I need to order the fiberglass rock to hide the back-flow valve manifold that was just installed and prepare it for winterization.

Electrical & Lighting

Bagwell Electric, Mark Bagwell 2)-Install 3-wall packs on the outside of the gym wall. The cost is \$2,125. As I've discussed, this project is on the side of the Activity/Gym towards Knowles Street. A member of St. Luke's has stepped forward to pay for this project. The light fixtures and related materials are being ordered and gathered, and work should start soon.

HVAC

Thursday, May 9, the new evaporator coil replacement and expansion valve for one of the 20-ton AC units were installed in Laird Hall (the downstairs basement/organ closet). By NAPPs Heating, Cooling, and Plumbing. Cost \$7,490.67.

Trustee Workday

The Trustee Team worked very hard at Trustee Work Day to clean and repair the gutters around the campus. The problem is that we're all old, and Garry Mount is the only one who would go up on the extension ladder. So, the rest of us power-washed the entire plaza in front of the Family Center. Altogether, we got started about 9:45 a.m. and finished up around 3:30 p.m. To my knowledge, our plaza has never been completely power-washed before.

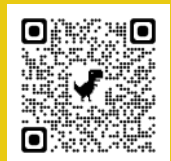

THE DISTRACTED AMERICAN FAMILY: PART TWO

In *The Hidden Smile of God*, John Piper says, "There is a great gulf between the Christianity that wrestles with whether to worship at the cost of imprisonment and death, and the Christianity that wrestles with whether the kids should play soccer on Sunday morning." Now, I'm not here to criticize those who encourage their children to play soccer. So, feel free to insert whatever activity you would like into the quotation above that has the potential for distracting you and your family from what's most important in life: worship. Here's the point: **if it's even a question of whether or not you and your family should attend church on Sunday morning or do _____ (insert whatever activity you would like) then it's time to hit the reset button on your family's priorities.**

What if - and please hear me out here - you treated Sunday unlike any other day of the week, so much so that your extended family and friends and neighbors started asking questions about why you live this way? Keeping the seventh day of the week (the "sabbath") "holy" was so important to God that it made his top ten list, and it is the one commandment that gets the most attention out of those ten (see Exodus 20: 8-11)! Rather than dive into the "nuts and bolts" of this passage, I want to give you some very practical tips for how best to obey this command in a distracted world.

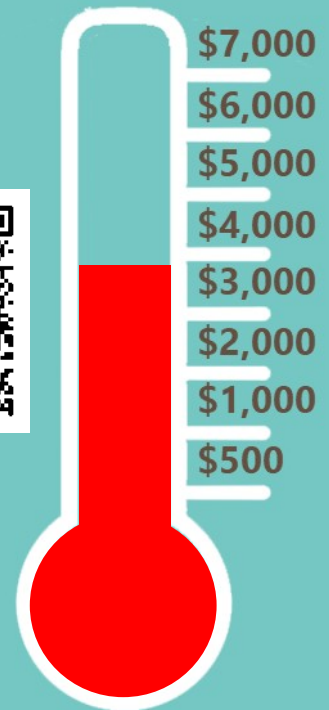
First, there are two parts to this command and the first part is to "remember". Remembering the sabbath is vital because we are as humans apt to forget because we are so distracted with nitty-gritty details of life. Job, kids, school, bills, sickness, vacations, emails, social media, phone calls, text-messages, etc. etc. **You remember what is important!** And when you "remember" that the Lord made everything (you didn't!), you acknowledge that all you have is a gift from him. In our distracted world, we need constant reminders of our place in this world.

The second part of this commandment is "to keep it holy." The Hebrew word translated "holy" here means "separate" or "different." A recent Gallup poll indicates that only twenty percent of Americans polled attend church each week. Just by attending church on Sunday, you are different than eighty percent of your neighbors. Besides attending church, what if you and your family decided to focus on imitating God's "rest" from his labor of creation. A great way to "rest" your mind is to turn the cell phones and computers off! Make Sunday different and special by intentionally doing family activities together. Plan a picnic in the park, watch a game together, have some friends over and play in the backyard, go for a walk together, ride bikes together, play games together, watch a movie together, etc. There are so many family activities that you can do together that cost nothing financially and that require little to no planning. Finally, "keep" means "guard." Parents, you have to protect this day from the outside distractions of this world. Soccer is great, but not on Sunday. You can guard your family by guarding the Sabbath. And if your kiddos have a problem with it, tell them to take it up with the King of the Universe who made everything. This isn't about you. It's not about them. It's about Him.

GOAL

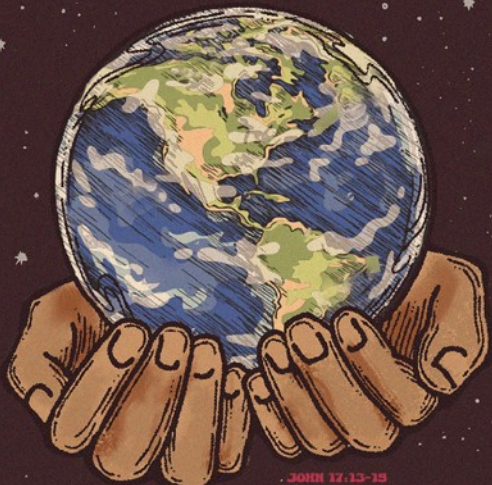
