

APPLY DIRECT PRESSURE AS NEEDED



To the outsider, my dad might have seemed rough and unsmiling. One of the many attributes remembered at his memorial service was his dry humor. No one was immune. I remember the many times during my years of elementary and high school that my dad would put on a severe face when a friend was visiting and say to us something like "No laughing, no smiling, no having fun." It was hard to explain his brand of kidding to my friends. Many of them would feel rather terrified because his serious poker face never wavered

Along the same lines, Duane Andrews loved to cause alarm by pulling an unexpected stunt. His main "move" was to sit on top of people and act like he didn't notice. If one protested, he would apply more pressure by burrowing more solidly into their lap. Above we see him in this trademark position on the lap of his 10-year-old grandson, William (who is now 24!)

The fascinating thing about my father's years of pretend severity and faux abuse is that we LOVED it! It was comforting! I would give almost anything to have him back for another sneak attack. It felt good to feel his direct pressure on you, knowing it was benign, and the temporary discomfort was sort of a "test" that you knew was not going to kill you.

This leads me to realize that we are a world intolerant of pressure. Somehow, we've become so fragile as a culture, our lack of patience will not allow direct pressure. We don't want, for instance, to be confronted on our versions of the truth, on our decisions about life, or regarding personal improvements we can make. We view pressure as oppositional, not challenging or productive.

St. Luke's has a mission inherent in its very existence. That mission is to demonstrate that direct pressure is an opportunity to reposition and improve that which may be fragile in us as a church and as individual believers. Recently, you received a letter from me stating a need for intentional tithing to the general budget. I have made my extra contribution, one that represented direct pressure to my budget. I hope you will join me in this act of support.

Beyond the direct pressure of maintaining our place of worship and ministry offerings, I hope we will all reposition and respond to the direct pressure of engaging in spiritual growth. When I speak to people about their greatest desire (when it comes to their faith), the overwhelming response is a concern for spiritual growth. In the Methodist world, we call this a movement toward holiness, or the process of sanctification. I think it is well and good to desire this. But will we respond to the opportunities ever before us, or dodge the direct pressure of the Holy Spirit moving us to walk more closely with God?

Sometimes we look to dodge commitment and pressure, opting for a short cut to our Christian maturity. We think that if we just understood the right truths or had a certain spiritual experience, we would then be a Christian, case closed. Indeed, we read in 2 Corinthians 5:17, "" Therefore, if anyone

is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. We do well however to remember this as the beginning of spiritual maturity, not the end. The question many of us have is, "Where do we go from here"?

The Bible addresses spiritual growth using terms like sanctification and holiness. These terms are used to describe the life-long progression of each Christian toward spiritual maturity: "but as he who called you is holy, you are also to be holy in all your conduct, "since it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." (I Peter 1:15-16) There is no one-time experience that will make us a mature Christian. Those seeking such will experience at best oscillating spiritual maturity, and at worst discouragement, frustration, and loss of faith. We cannot become spiritually mature if we only drink spiritual milk... We must move on to the meat.

How do we progress toward spiritual maturity? God has given us several tools to grow up. I think everyone would agree that He has given us His word to build us up and that He has given us His Spirit to transform us. But where are we practicing obedience to His word? And where are we exercising the gifts and fruit of the Holy Spirit? It certainly doesn't happen at home in our favorite chair nestled under an afghan. God has given us other people, the Christian community, for the purpose of sharpening our understanding of God's word. God has given us the church as a place to employ the gifts and fruit of the Holy Spirit...

"And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes. Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love." – Ephesians 4:11-16 (ESV)

The real question this article poses is in how you address your need for spiritual growth... Do you look for short cuts? Or will you allow yourself to feel the sacred pressure to move forward by practicing God's word and exercising God's Spirit with and through God's community, the church? I'm directly pressuring you to come to a <u>Wednesday Night Worship at 5:30</u> in Knowles Chapel, or to Bible study following that 30 minute service, or to become part of a small group. I'm pressing you to take seriously the <u>importance of coming to Sunday worship and keeping the Sabbath Holy</u>. I want you to feel a little pushed by God's spirit to avail you, friends, and family to <u>get connected</u> with God and his church.

Yes, it is my job to try to get you to come to church and be involved in the activities. But that is not the point at all! It is God's direct and intentional will that you take your faith, and your family's faith, seriously enough to lead, encourage by example, and enable regular and first-hand experience in a spiritual and religious life, so that one day we may all be found holy, unblemished, and perfect in His sight.

THE CHRIST-CENTERED HOME

What does a Christ-centered home look like? I have often asked this question, and at different times in my life, I have arrived at different answers. When I was a young parent, I thought it meant that as a Father I had to lead my family in worship each day. This dream, however, did not match with reality. My family was bored and unaffected, and I was discouraged and disappointed.

Too often, we as parents place burdens on ourselves that the Lord never placed on us, and we end up feeling guilty and ashamed when we do not meet those standards. It is true that fathers specifically are charged by Paul in his letter to the Ephesians with bringing up our children "in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (6:4). Paul is careful to leave the command broad. What does bringing one's children up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord look like? He does not say that parents must conduct family worship with their children each night at 7:00 pm and that two Psalms must be sung and a passage from the Old Testament and New Testament must be read. There is nothing wrong with an organized family worship time each day. But, when we create prescriptions such as that and treat them as laws, we diminish the power of the Gospel in our home by relegating the Spirit to one moment in the day, instead of seeing him present in every moment of life.

Lately, I have been thinking deeply about what this passage means for my family, and I have concluded that the manner in which I raise up my daughter "in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" will probably look different for me than it does for other parents. And that is perfectly okay! I like to couple Paul's command with the charge in Deuteronomy: "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates" (Deut. 6:5-9).

From this passage, I conclude that a Christ-centered home begins with a Christ-centered parent whose heart has been changed by the Gospel and who is so consumed with a passionate and zealous love for the Lord that he/she sees Christ in every moment! Whether it be sitting, walking, lying down, getting up, working with one's hands, this parent cannot shut up about the goodness of Jesus! Parents, if you want to see your child's heart transformed by the Gospel, you must first show him/her a heart and a life transformed by God's word. The parent described in Deuteronomy views all of life ("frontlets between your eyes") through the lenses of God's word and lives a consistent life of faithfulness at home ("the doorposts of your house"), just as he does in public ("and on your gates"). This kind of "teaching" is not restricted to the classroom. It is all of life. As the parent, you are God's chief representative to your children. In you, they see and hear the Lord. What a grand opportunity we have as parents. God help us not to waste it!



ENDOW MENT eport

The endowment committee has been hard at work this year overseeing the investing and use of St. Luke's endowment funds. I would like to give you some perspective of how these funds are being used. Not only do we have funds to provide for college scholarships, ministry development, and repair and maintenance for our organ, just to name a few, but we also have two very important funds that have contributed to our overall operating costs over the last several years.

To give you a glimpse into the impact of the Ballard and Maintenance accounts, I first want to say that we have limits on the percentage of the income produced from these investments. These limits are never exceeded. However, we have come close to using the upper parameters of these restrictions of use due to the church's financial needs in 2024. Looking at the usage of these funds since 2009, I see that we are on track for withdrawing from these funds more wisely than before with a peak in 2022 and a drop after that in 2023 of \$50,000. The Board of Stewards, Finance Support Team, and Endowment committee have been meeting diligently this year to keep a close eye on our finances and the usage of St. Luke's endowment funds.

Because of the blessings of our endowments, we would not be able to cover the expenses of our church. As the general cost of maintaining the facility rises, as it has in all our households, it is more important than ever to give as robustly as we can to the general operating fund of the church. As a congregation, we need to reclaim responsibility in giving so we don't exceed our recommended withdrawal limits on endowments.
